ATSIAP Challenge

The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Aspirations Program (ATSIAP) is an initiative for high-performing Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students attending Queensland state schools.

ATSIAP is a state-wide academic challenge for eligible students in Years 7 to 12. The program builds upon students' critical and creative thinking skills by providing opportunities to investigate solutions for real-world challenges. ATSIAP aims to raise students' expectations of themselves as learners and enhance post-school aspirations to include tertiary pathways.

We had a team of 4 students – Shaylee, Tayah, Bryony and Will, led my Mrs Apanui, compete in the Senior section this year. They were one of the youngest there. The challenge involves speech, poetry and art around a given topic.

Thank you to Aunty Joyce Summers for being a community voice for our students to engage with in regard to the Stolen Generation and White Australia Policy for this project.

Our young team excelled themselves, gaining second place in the regional challenge, putting themselves through to the State Challenge.





Deadly Choices

We have been running our Deadly Choices Program again this year, with Years 7 in Term 2 and 3 completing the Healthy Lifestyle Program and the Tobacco Education Program This Term we have the Year 9's completing the new updated Healthy Lifestyle Program.

The Deadly Choices program is for a group of up to 15 students and runs during P2 on a Wednesday.



NRL School to Work Program

The NRL's School to Work Program encourages young Indigenous Australians to complete their schooling and transition into further education and employment.

PBC's School to Work Program is affiliated with the Gold Coast Titans. We currently have 5 students in Year 12 and 6 in Year 11 involved in the program.

QATSIF GRADUATING CEREMONY

The graduating ceremony for our Year 12 QATSIF students was held at Bond Uni at the start of August.

This ceremony is to acknowledge and celebrate our QATSIF Scholarship students on the Gold Coast.

PBC had one of the highest numbers of participating students.





NRL SCHOOL TO WORK YOUTH SUMMIT

Congrats to Hayley Lyons who was picked to represent PBC and the Titans at the NRL School to Work Youth Summit in Sydney earlier this year.

The Indigenous Youth Leadership Summit is an opportunity for participants to interact with other young leaders through a series of workshops, activities and discussions around leadership, culture, teamwork, positive perceptions and more.

WHAT IS QATSIF?

QATSIF was created to give Queensland's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families increased educational choices and life opportunities. It is an independent, not-for-profit trust managed by The Public Trustee of Queensland and operates through a small Secretariat. The funds used by QATSIF for its programs and activities are drawn from the interest earned on the original capital provided to The Public Trustee to establish the Trust.

The scholarship provides funds for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Year 11 and 12 students for educational expenses that are billed through the school. We have applied for scholarships for over 25 of our current Year 10 for next year. A lot of man hours go into getting these forms sorted and in. The funds are then held by the school and released when the students hit set attendance and academic targets

Week One in Term 3 we celebrated NAIDOC with our full school assembly.

The event was hosted by Tanu Nona and Bailee Whitehouse of Year 12. The Bundjalung Kunjiel dancers performed with three of our students – Bella, Tia and Jakeem.

The course involved learning how to assist Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander young people who may be developing a mental illness, experiencing a worsening of an existing mental health problem or in a mental health crisis, until appropriate professional help is received or the crisis resolves.
